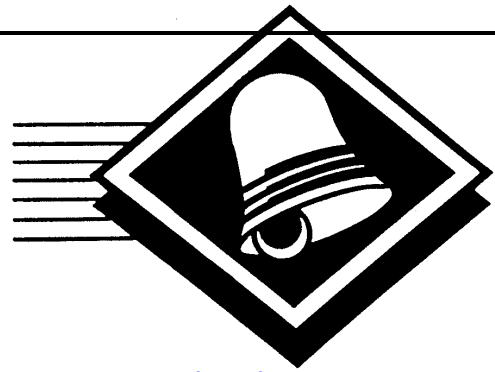

From the

Transitional Senior Pastor

It was February of 1993; I was in Hartford for a candidating weekend, in which I was being introduced to the members and friends of the South Congregational Church. I had become interested in the position of Senior Pastor at that church in the spring of 1992. It was nearly one year since I had put together my Ministerial Profile and had it submitted to the Pastoral Search Committee of the church. I was relatively happy in the Michigan church I was serving at the time I put myself forward for consideration by that search committee, but was feeling a certain restlessness and a sense of being drawn to a new challenge.

I was invited to interview with their Search Committee in September and had flown out to Connecticut from Michigan for a two hour interview. Several weeks later they invited me back for a second and much more extensive interview. I spent an extra day during that visit out here in order to look at the area and prayerfully think about moving my young family.

I was then invited back for a third interview which included spending informal time with several members of the committee over the course of two days. At the end of that time together, I was told by the Search Committee that they wanted to recommend me to the members of the church as their next settled Senior Pastor. I had been growing more and more excited about the opportunities for ministry in Hartford, but asked for a few days to pray for guidance and consult with others. I concluded that I was being guided toward this new professional opportunity, and with it the incredible personal changes for my family and me.

So we set up a candidating weekend for late in February 1993. Prior to that weekend, only two people in the church I was serving in Michigan knew that I was actively engaged in discernment around a calling to another church. Of necessity the process was completely confidential. At any point it could have become a closed door and so I did not share with the church that I was serving that I was prayerfully considering leaving them.

During that candidating weekend the guidance of God was confirmed as the church voted to call me as their next settled Pastor. I was simultaneously overjoyed at the anticipation of the new position, and aware of how sad it would be to tell people in Michigan that I would be leaving. I returned to Michigan and sent out a letter informing the congregation I had served for nearly 8 years that I had accepted a new call and would be giving up my position as their pastor. The members of that church and I began a process of saying "good bye" and of ending our pastoral relationship.

For the next several weeks, I vacillated back and forth looking forward and looking back, eager to get started but grieving the loss of what I had known and the people I had loved. I was ready to begin with a new church and saddened to leave what was going to become my 'former' church.

I am sharing this extended remembrance for two reasons:

1. The Pastoral Search Committee of our church is beginning to interview candidates and those candidates will be going through the same kind of discernment process that I went through. For those applicants the search process can be a rather solitary experience, as people in the church they are currently serving will not know that this major change for them and for their pastor is being contemplated. It is an emotionally complicated experience of highs and lows, anticipation and hope, sometimes coupled with disappointment and loss.

At this point the Search Committee is not yet focused on a single individual or ready to bring that chosen person to meet with all of you. Their work will take a while longer, and will result in them presenting an exceptionally talented Pastor, who they believe is being called to be here. Your vote of call will confirm that God has been in this process of discernment.

2. I have recently completed my Interim Minister Profile and submitted it to the Connecticut Conference. This means that I can now be formally considered for an interim opening in another church. It means that I have now begun a process which will lead to the ending of my pastoral leadership among you—not immediately, but at some point in the future. I would expect that my interim ministry search process will last a few months, but at this time I do not know where that next church will be and am unclear about when I will begin that new ministry.

We have known from the beginning that at some point we would be saying “good bye.” But even with that realization, this is an emotionally charged Carillon Column for me to write. It makes this a more clear reality. For me this reality is both exciting, as I consider where the Spirit of God may be preparing me to go, and painful, as I think about all the good things that we have shared together in this family of faith.

I am grateful for the presence and faithful ministry of Pastor Karen, who will be a constant pastoral presence, even as I end my tenure here and you prepare to welcome a gifted and spiritually grounded, settled Senior Minister.

One of the aspects of being an Interim (Transitional) Pastor which I really appreciate is being able to share my search process with you. It does not need to be a secret or held in confidence, because we know that this ending is a part of what we signed on for when we said “yes” to one another back at the beginning in June of 2007. So over the next several months I will be intentionally disengaging and getting ready for moving on. Simultaneously, we will be preparing to say “Good bye and God bless you!”

Let us hold one another in our prayers.

OOPS! Sorry. Excuse me. I goofed. Please forgive me. Oh dear. Oh my goodness. OOPS!

Have you ever had occasion to need to say those words? Or think them even as you strove mightily to “fix” whatever inspired their need? We all have. And yet those can be very hard words to say. And sometimes, they can be just as hard to hear.

We live in a world where blame has become a reflex and dodging it has become a national sport. The very act of expressing regret has come to imply responsibility for whatever has gone awry. And so the cycle continues. Simple mistakes balloon into problems for which someone or something must be blamed. Dodging or deflecting the implied or direct implications leads quickly to mistrust, misunderstanding and, too often, the disruptive or even destructive effects of widening miscommunication. Whew. Try saying that ten times fast!

Or, better yet, don’t. Don’t get caught up in unwieldy machinations that do nothing to address the real issue. Don’t get swept up in the blame-game craze.

Paul writes: “Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God – what is good and acceptable and perfect.” (Romans 12:2) Like forgiveness. Like turning the other cheek. Like seeking and speaking the truth in love and loving your neighbors enough to believe they are trying to do the same.

It’s not easy. In fact, it’s counter-cultural. That’s why it’s so important. And that’s why it’s so important to practice in the church.

A bunch of years ago, Dorothy Bass and a collection of insightful colleagues wrote a book called, “Practicing Our Faith.” Their premise was that congregations have the opportunity – and an obligation – to be the safe space in which their people can transform their best intentions into sustained and sustaining expressions of their faith. Neither they nor we are after a simple, singular experience. This is about the long-haul.

As I write this third and last article about this church’s behavioral covenant, I am struck by the courage it will take to embrace it – not as a document, those are too easy to file; not as an experiment, those are too quick to conclude; and certainly not as just a statement about what we consider to be the ideal. I want to know what it feels like to practice. To risk doing it wrong. To tempt blame and, when appropriate, accept it. To say, “Oops,” and/or “I’m sorry” and to let others feel as free with me. ’Wanna try? The script is on the next page!

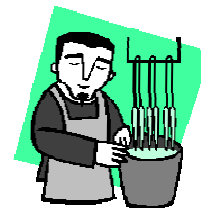

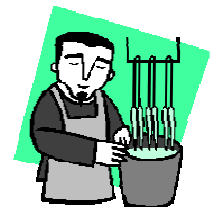

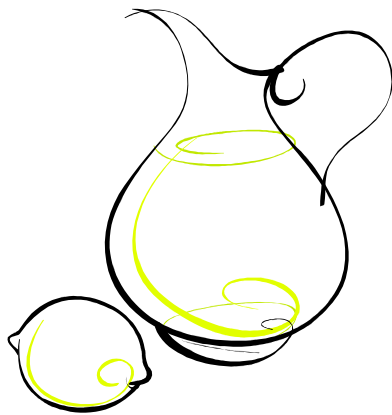

1. Called to Order by Louise Wright at 7:00 P.M.

2. Meditation and Candle Lighting: Bob Malecki, Dick Roberts and Chuck lit the three candles. Dr. Jay noted the "cauldron for joy," an empty bowl on the center table. He read from Nehemiah – "the joy of the Lord is your strength." We were then invited to share instances of joy to fill the cauldron. Items mentioned included the beautiful spring, children's awe of nature, surviving a freak snowstorm in New Hampshire, the women's basketball team, the potential for our church family, Josh and Nate, Samantha's pitching her first varsity game, an upcoming visit from Paulla's foster daughter, Dr. Jay's ministry with us, and Deborah's talents as office administrator. Dr. Jay closed the meditation with a prayer from "Gorilla's of Grace."

3. Additions to the Agenda: None.

4. Review of Council Minutes:

a. Pam moved and Lynn seconded that we approve the Minutes of March 16. Motion passed unanimously.

b. Lynn moved and Pam seconded that we approve the Minutes of April 6 (Special Meeting). Motion passed unanimously.

5. Present to Speak: None.

6. Old Business

a. **Senior Pastor.** Dr. Jay is having an enjoyable time wrapping up the church year. He is working on a profile to advertise his availability for a new ministry. His search will play out over the next several months. He asks that we keep him in our prayers.

Dr. Jay next displayed a beautiful photo of a stained glass window offered to the church by Harriet and John Brubacher, who are moving to New Hampshire. The council accepted the gift by unanimous acclamation. Pam suggested that the photo be passed along to the nascent Art Group and all concurred.

b. **Interim Associate Minister's Report.** Karen experienced a wonderful second month in her new ministry, dividing her time more or less evenly between worship preparation, pastoral care and education. A recent meeting with the junior PF was a special joy. She raised the issue of changes in our governance system, an issue that was brought up at the March Council meeting. Some decisions should wait for the new Senior Pastor, but some preparatory work is appropriate. Karen has compiled a file of resources. She encourages us to envision where we want to go and why. She proposes creating some exercises to bring people together on the governance issue and examine the possibilities.

Louise urged immediate action. Karen agreed to write a paragraph announcing the exercises, which will be disseminated to the individual boards and committees. After critique and tailoring of the exercises, committee chairs will conduct the exercises and report back to Karen.

c. Senior Pastor Search Committee: Bob Malecki reported that the committee is surging forward. They are ready to select possible candidates. At present they are calling references and discussing the feedback from these conversations.

d. Welcoming All: Pam reported that her committee is meeting quarterly. The next meeting is June 7th, chaired by Paul Schur. Follow-up tasks for pledge reminders and announcements on progress are planned and will be implemented in April and May between meetings. The remission of pledges has exceeded projections and the interest and principal on loans is being repaid earlier than expected.

e. Building Committee: Pam reported that she had no specifics from Building Committee. However, Paulla, a member of the building committee, noted that choices for the carpet repair in the elevator hallway are on the radiator for comment.

f. Space and Facilities. Marge Brown, Paulla Dixon, Carol Jordan, Ann Marie Thompson, and Mark Roy have formed a task force to supervise remodeling of the Memorial Room as authorized at the March Council meeting.

The new bulletin board system seems to be working well. Contact Pam for additional information.

g. FUNd-raising 2010. The information from the 2009 fund raising projects has been reviewed and the potential for projects in 2010 has been discussed with the relevant individuals, boards and committees. Projections of income toward the fund-raising item of \$10,000 in the budget for 2010 have been made. Some calendar decisions need finalizing. Pam contributed the following table of activities and their estimated incomes. Note that a minimum projected income of exactly \$10,000 emerged.

Liz Cowles shared Growth Board plans for a Church Family Pasta Dinner on Sunday September 26th. Pam indicated she would consider the Sept 26th event and invited others to inform her of potential Sept/Oct events and church plans.

Ed Tomastik asked how use of any fundraising income over \$10,000 would be determined. Pam understands that all income from these activities would be credited to the fundraising line item; and if income exceeds the budget the excess would be included in "surplus" at the end of the budget year. Ed noted that the Finance board is "looking to find additional income for salary support."

The goal is to maximize the potential for fundraising outcomes at each event. We would celebrate our outcomes as an indication of the spiritual vitality of the congregation and our ability to draw the general public into our fundraising efforts increasing our visibility in the community. Pam said coordination is occurring without fundraising "meetings," but she would be happy to create a time to meet if there is a request to do so. Council members requested and Pam agreed to provide more frequent and detailed information as plans evolve.

h. Resignation from Christian Education Board. Betty moved and Dick Roberts seconded that we accept Nancy Tomastik's resignation from the CE Board. Passed unanimously.

At this point the meeting was interrupted by Dick and Pam Roberts. They first shepherded through a motion to depart from the published agenda. Then, a long list of “whereases” introduced a proclamation celebrating Louise Wright’s birthday on April 22. They presented Louise with a gift certificate for dinner for her and Zach. Finally, they led the Council in singing Happy Birthday to Louise, whom we all recognize as one of the great blessings of our church.

Order having been restored, we returned to the published agenda.

7. New Business.

- a. **Church-wide Publicity.** The Growth Board has been exploring ways to improve the publicity for our church. A number of examples were given to illustrate the need for this effort. Growth proposes a Publicity Task Force that will be a stand-alone entity with delegates from other boards and committees. Tasks include

- Web site update
- Compilation of a list of places and publications where items can be posted.
- Church clearing house for news items.

The goal is to attract new members. After considerable discussion, Wally agreed to assemble a task force and bring a report to the May Council Meeting.

- 8. Treasurer’s report.** Dave was not in attendance but had provided financial reports. No problems were noted.

- 9. Council Chair’s report.** Louise asked: Do we need a calendar meeting on May 2? In the interest of simplification, Louise proposed that individual boards and committees bring calendar updates to Deborah and to the Council each month. Major events should be penciled in well in advance. A calendar update item will be added to the agenda of Council meetings to provide an opportunity for communication.

Some calendar updates were discussed. In particular, May 16 will be the last day of Sunday School and Teacher Appreciation Day. Confirmation has been moved from June to May 9th, Mother’s Day, and the Deacons dinner for the three confirmands and their families will occur on May 8th. Paula brought up the potential conflict with the WF Plant Bake and Tag Sale already on the schedule for that weekend. Dr. Jay indicated that space use could be worked out since they expect a small group of about 24 people for the confirmands dinner. Carolyn Holmy reported that Vacation Bible School will be held June 21-24, at 6-8 pm daily. VBS will be intergenerational this year.

Louise will cancel the May 2 calendar meeting. Pam offered to discuss with Deborah ways to print out the scheduled items on the calendar to better meet the needs of the Council members. Previously, space limitations seemed to make usage of the existing calendar format difficult.

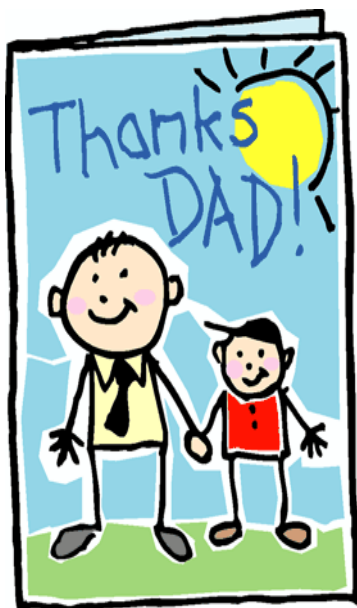
