HAVE A MINUTE?

Thoughts from Pastor Matt...

In lieu of my typical "Have a Minute?" column, this month

I share with you the "State of the Church" address I gave at our 2015 Annual Meeting on January 25th:

Good afternoon! It's my honor to stand before you today as the senior minister of this church to invite vou for a few moments to think with me about where we are and where we are headed together.

Now, back in a previous era before most churches had in-house printing capability—mimeographs and the like, followed, of course, by our modern photocopiers and printers—it was a regular thing for the minister to address the congregation with an annual report at the annual meeting. You've already got my annual report, though, in your hands, so I don't plan to simply repeat all the data and facts from that now.

I do want to draw your attention to a number, though. 525,600 [this was displayed on screen]. Does anyone recognize this number? Perhaps this will help. [At this point, a video of the song "Seasons of Love" from the Broadway musical Rent was played.] In arguably the best known number from the hit musical *Rent* by

Jonathan Larson, which ran on Broadway from 1996 to 2008, we are asked 'how do you measure a year?' Is it simply the 525,600 minutes? Is it enumerated by the hours of daylight seen, the cups of coffee consumed, the truths that a woman learned, or the times that a man cried?

In reflecting on the state of a church—of any church, of our church—you could look for signs like those, and many do. Is the state of our church as we enter 2015 measured by the number of people we have in the pews on a Sunday morning, or the number of clergy we are proud to tell others we have in the chancel, or the relative increase or decrease in our budget? Or perhaps it's not simply the quantities of things. Maybe it's about the moments... moments of beauty that raise our spirits, moments of majesty that move our souls, moments of care that make us feel connected and embraced.

In any of these ways, the numbers and the moments, I would say that things here at the Storrs Congregational Church, United Church of Christ, are going pretty well. In a broader cultural climate in which church attendance across the board is declining, in all geographic regions and in all denominational traditions, we've been able over the past three or so years to at least stay stable. In times when plenty of churches are facing severe financial pinches, eating away at endowments

and adopting budgets with four- and five-digit deficits, we have for the moment kept a sound financial house and comparatively very-well-maintained facilities—even if it's not always all that we might want. And the moments... beauty and majesty, absolutely these have been abundant, and even more so care: the spirit of care that you, the people of this congregation, have for one another and for others is simply astounding. It really is.

As we look ahead to 2015 and beyond, the reality is that we are going to inevitably spend a good bit of time in the coming year talking and working with matters of governance. Governance is, I do believe, a significant issue we need to deal with in this congregation. But just like how the spirit of care and compassion living deep in the soul of this congregation doesn't have to do with numbers, neither do I believe the important shifts we need to make in governance are about numbers. Our success with this transformation will not be measured simply in the number of elected positions we end up with, or the precise enumerations of policies and powers—as important as those things will be.

Rather, all of this work on governance has to do with *how we* see ourselves and each other. Do we want leadership that actually *leads*, and are we willing to trust each other enough to let that happen?

Are we willing to explore new ways of working and being together, even and especially if we don't have all the details worked out right at first, in order that we can begin the journey toward being the church God needs us to be today, tomorrow, and into the future?

And, in the end, all this governance stuff is also about how we understand what our *purpose* is as a church... which, my friends, is not ultimately to run a church. Yes, that's right, and I'll say it again. Our purpose as a church is *not* to *run* a church. Our purpose is to take part in God's mission, to be a part of the things God is doing to and in and for the world. Our prayer, as Church Council and many of our boards have been praying together each month for nearly 3 years now, is that God would "bless what we do, so that we can do that which God is already blessing." We need to never forget that, as individuals or as this body together.

The "Seasons of Love" song from *Rent* asks "how about love?" It admonishes us to "*measure* in love". Indeed, in 2015, let us make the measurements of the Storrs Congregational Church, United Church of Christ, be the measurements of love. Not only—or perhaps not even—the love which we demonstrate here within our own walls and among our own people. But let it be the love of God which this campus of the University

of Connecticut, this community of Storrs and Mansfield, this region of central northeastern Connecticut, and this whole world comes to know and experience... because of what we're doing and believing and saying and praying here. Let us measure our fundraising success not by whether we can raise more money to support our own operations, but rather by how we much we can raise for others, using the gifts and resources we already have. Let us measure the effectiveness of our governance not by whether any one of us has had the opportunity to have our own say, but by whether or not the voice of God was heard in our midst, and whether we followed it.

All of this brings me back to one final number, perhaps the only number that truly matters: one. That 'one' is each one of you. Each one of you has the power to decide whether and how you will be fully part of this church's work to take part in God's mission to the world. Each one of you has gifts to share and a calling to fulfill. Each one of you can make the choice to approach fellow congregants and identified leaders in the spirit of trust and openness and exploration. Each one of you has been claimed by none other than Jesus Christ, and each one of you has been joined by Christ into this rag-tag collection of people called church... so that together we can be the instrument by which God blesses others and all the world.

May it be so, in 2015 and forever. Amen.

Earth Crisis/America's Dilemma

With the purposed upcoming Paris climate summit in December of this year, there are now some signs of hope that the nations of the world can come together to save their common home, Mother Earth. After nearly 20 years and several climate summits in Kyoto, Qatar, Copenhagen, BuenosAires, and most recently the Conference of Parties (COP) gathered this past December in Lima, it is hoped that the nations of the world are ready to work on a formula for self-imposed decreases in greenhouse gases to curb the pollution that is causing global warming.

The big stumbling block from the beginning of negotiations in Kyoto in 1997 was the inequality of the decrease of green house gases being needed and requested. The developing countries should in fairness have the opportunity to continue to pollute in order to develop and industrialize for their people.

At the recent Lima COP the following agreements were made:

- the creation of the U.N. Green Climate Fund from which money will be made available to help developing countries use green technologies;
- an equitable formula that will be used to help developing and developed countries set their self-imposed goals of reduction of greenhouse gases

Last November President Obama made an agreement with China that allows China until 2030 to reach their peak pollution of greenhouse gases. At the same time, by 2025 the U.S. should decrease our pollution levels by an addition 26% from the 2005 levels. (We have the technology to do this.) The European Union pledged to cut emissions 40% by 2030 based on 1990 levels. Other countries have until the end of March to prepare their self-imposed goals to take to the Paris summit in December of this year.

I call this our American Dilemma because to many in our country this does not seem fair or possible. The first factor to bring into our equation is our motto of "No one can do everything, but everyone can (and should) do something." What we are talking about here is the future state of our common home, Mother Earth, in which we are all saved together or destroyed together. This is probably the first time in human history that what happens to one, happens to all.

When I turn to the scriptures of our Judeo-Christian heritage, I think of the Old Testament prophet Micah saying, "What does the Lord require of you, but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God." (Micah 6:8) In our Christian scriptures, we read, "From everyone to whom much has been given, much will be required; and from the one to whom much has been entrusted, even more will be demanded." (Luke 12:48b) All this is emphasized in the Sermon on the Mount when Jesus says, "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth . . for where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." (Matt: 6:19-21) Then Luke, in chapter 12, tells of the rich fool who built bigger and bigger barns to store his wealth only to find out that tomorrow he would die.

In articles I have been reading in environmental newsletters, the theme is often that our true hope is in the grassroots involvement our democracy. We know our democracy seems to be in a log-jamb of unproductive debate, but there are many and increasing environmental issues that are calling for our involvement. A quote from the Fall 2014 issue of "Friends of the Earth," presents its source of grassroots hope by saying, "As students, clergy, and ordinary folks around the country convince their colleges, faith-based institutions, and local governments to divest from fossil fuels, we hope for an increasingly powerful base of people whose voices raised together will drown out the clink of cash from the fossil fuel industries." (Page 10)

Our church's recent program to replace light bulbs in our sanctuary from 40 watt incandescent bulbs to 2 watt LED bulbs is a good example of grassroots steps that need to be taken for it will decrease the amount of CO2 emissions by 80%. As the scriptures teach us, "From whom much is given, much should be required. So let us love kindness, do justice, and walk humbly with our God.

Washington's Birthday is a United States federal holiday celebrated on the third Monday of February in honor of George

Washington, the first President of the United States. Colloquially, it is widely known as "Presidents Day" and is often an occasion to remember all the presidents, not just George Washington or Abraham Lincoln, whose birthday is also in February.[1] The term "Presidents Day" was informally coined in a deliberate attempt to use the holiday to honor multiple presidents and is virtually always used that way today.[2]

With official names including Presidents' Day, President's Day and Washington's and Lincoln's Birthday, the day is also a state holiday in most states.[1] It officially celebrates, depending upon the state, Washington alone, Washington and Lincoln, or some other combination of U.S. presidents.[1] Some states celebrate Washington and the third president Thomas Jefferson but not Lincoln.[1] Both Lincoln's and Washington's birthdays are in February.[3] In historical rankings of Presidents of the United States both Lincoln and Washington are frequently, but not always, the top two presidents.
