

TAKING TIME WITH PASTOR BOB



Dear Members and Friends,

I look forward to serving as your supply minister for the month of October while your Interim Senior Minister, Reverend Debra is on vacation in Italy. At the request of the church, I will be working only as worship leader for the five Sundays and in handling any emergency pastoral needs.

The previous period I was working with you was for four months of September-

December 2017. I was the supply minister during the sabbatical of Pastor Matt Emery, while he was in England and Germany. During that time I was working 3-4 days each week with many more responsibilities than this current assignment.

I look forward to seeing you at worship on Sundays. I will be following the public health protocols of the pandemic and the guidance of the Storrs Church. As with many of you, I have been living under the restrictions of the past sixteen months. Only recently have I been resuming some of my activities and life in Springfield, MA. This October, during the Welcome time of Sunday worship, I will read the following Land Acknowledgement Statement. This is a statement adopted by the University of Connecticut in April, 2019. The Worship team of our church may modify or add to this statement at a later date. A Land Acknowledgement is a formal statement that recognizes and respects Native peoples as traditional stewards of lands. The statement highlights the enduring relationship between Native peoples and their traditional territories.

Land Acknowledgement Statement

"We would like to begin by acknowledging that the land on which we gather is the territory of the Mohegan, Mashantucket Pequot, Eastern Pequot, Schaghticoke (ska-teh-COKE), Golden Hill Paugussett (paw-GUS-it) and Nipmuc Peoples, who have stewarded this land throughout the generations. We thank them for their strength and resilience in protecting this land, and aspire to uphold our responsibilities according to their example."

Bob Malecki (Treasurer) and Trisha Snyder (Director of Music Ministry) were also in attendance

Present to Speak

Bob Malecki (Treasurer) had three topics that were not on the agenda and the following business was conducted:

 Lightning damaged the church during a summer storm. An insurance claim is being submitted but funds are needed to cover the deductible of \$5000. Bob recommended that this money come from the Major Projects fund

Motion was made by Cass and seconded by Malta to use \$5000. from the Major Projects Fund to cover the deductible towards repairs due to the lightning strike this summer. Motion was approved unanimously.

2) Three parking spaces are being rented to UCONN students. Bob has clarified with a financial expert with the Southern NE Conference that income from parking spaces is taxable. Bob explained that the tax form is simple and recommended proceeding. He also asked for clarification about where these funds would go in the budget. Paul made a motion and Jane Ann seconded that the funds raised through rental of the parking spaces would go to the rental line in the budget. Motion was approved unanimously.

3) Bob explained that there is a parishioner who is helping out one or more individuals with dental expenses. There is precedent with this type of support as part of QCRR (Quiet Corner Refugee Resettlement), and the Legal Assistance fund. Bob suggested that he create an off-budget account titled Dental Assistance Fund which could be used to collect donations and disperse payments. The governing board agreed with this recommendation and Bob will proceed with setting up the account.

Trisha Snyder (Director of Music Ministry) proposed that she would like to create a music advisory team as part of the music ministry effort. Sue Irvine (board chair) with concurrence from all responded that it is totally within her purview to do this.

Duffy's Buildings and Grounds report raised the following items. (1) There are some Adirondack chairs that have been donated for placement in the courtyard. (2) There is also some play area refurbishment that Duffy and Lisa are discussing. (3) There is also some discussion of improving the signage to direct people to the church office. Duffy will explore options and bring a proposal to the governing board. If Duffy would like to proceed with temporary signs on an interim basis as part of developing the final proposal, that would be just fine. Stacy noted that Jan Castle has the information about the sign provider and format for indoor signs that were installed during the Welcoming All Elevator project and is considering adding some signs to direct people to the food pantry.

Pam Roberts sent an email to board in lieu of being present to speak. She is seeking input about Christmas Fair. Please respond directly to Pam with comments or suggestions.

Update from the Task Force for Resuming In-Person – Paul reported that the team continues to meet as required to provide guidance for worship and other church activities.

Update from the Pastoral Search Committee – Cass reported that the Search Committee is almost done with the church profile and is targeting to submit it to the conference by 10/15.

Leadership Discernment Committee – Stacy reported that Leadership Discernment committee will begin meeting soon. There have been notices for the open treasurer position in the carillon. So far, nobody has stepped forward.

Stewardship Planning – Sue reminded governing board of responsibility to conduct stewardship canvas. Jane Ann volunteered to participate from the Governing Board. Stacy will support and we will recruit one or two others to work with Pastor Debbie on this.

Safe Church Update-edits, risk management form, current staff form, fire drill – Sue provided an update. Review was completed by Sue, Darryl, and Malta. Very minor updates are being made to the risk assessment process for off-site travel. Deborah is revising the document for publication. It was also mentioned that Duffy is coordinating a fire drill for October.

Discussion about Privacy/Accessibility Guidelines– Pastor Debbie provided a quick overview of the recommended guidelines that have been developed. She and Sue got input from Tricia and the Tech Team (Jan, Andy, Don, and Erin) to draft the Prayer Guidelines and Worship Guidelines. The prayer guidelines have been published in the bulletin and in the Carillon (part of Pastor Debbie's notes). The fact that the worship services are recorded and live-streamed on YouTube is listed in the bulletin, and a sign will be placed in the Narthex with a message stating that the camera would not be on people sitting in the far-right corner of the sanctuary as they enter and if they have any questions to please see an usher.

- August sermon series on The Beatitudes included participation of three church members participating in discussion. Feedback on the series was positive on the application of the blessings in our personal lives.
- Rainbow Peace Pole was dedicated on Sunday, August 29.
- Worship Team and Lead Ministry Coordinators' met on August 18.
 Significant worship events were planned through the end of December and communicated with all of the church leaders.
- Summer chapel ended on August 19 with an average of two-six people attending each session.
- Participated with Lisa Haupt in the Steeplechase Fundraiser walk on behalf of SCC and our community partners.
- Planning to include short faith stories by church members as part of our stewardship campaign this fall.
- Ben Scudder began working on August 23 and current priorities include updating and adding to the church website, working with LMC's to highlight their work and events, working with Lisa to publicize faith formation info and events for all ages, and utilizing more social media platforms.
- Trisha, Lisa, and I attended UConn Resource Fairs Friday and Saturday during WOW weekend and I also met several students and families at the tag sale on Saturday. We also had contact with the various clubs on campus as well as representatives from Faith Row.
- September 12 will be "Welcome Back" Sunday with Communion, a focus
 on intergenerational worship and a labyrinth walk, and a blessing of the
 water for future baptisms. I will also include prayers to recognize Rosh
 Hashanah and the 10th anniversary of September 11, 2001.
- Worship liturgy is being planned for Just Peace Sunday on September 19 and American Indian Ministry Sunday on September 26. A blessing of the animals will take place on our front lawn on Saturday, September 25 at 11:00 a.m. The UConn community will also be invited and Ben will publicize.
- Continuing to support meetings and have begun to make house calls upon request.
- Some upcoming meetings I will be attending

 - o Just Peace Team meeting on September 23 to assist in planning upcoming initiatives.


Quiet Reflection at Waggoner Chapel

BUILDING & GROUNDS NEWS

Three massive trees once stood along the sidewalk at the top of the stairway to the lower lawn. Two of those trees were taken down last year because they were dying and posed a threat to the Education Wing and pedestrians. We were told that the third tree (between the other two) was reasonably healthy and should last for more years. That advice proved spectacularly wrong when the tree came crashing down in August. It could not have fallen at a worse time - the week of the "Welcome Back Tag and Bake Sale" and the final Carillon Concert of the season. Also, students were coming back to campus on that weekend and the downed tree would not help with the image of the UConn campus. We had trouble finding a tree service company that would handle it for us on short notice. UConn Utilities came through for us by arranging to have Distinctive Tree Service remove the tree and remaining trunk two days before our events. The picture should give you some idea of what we were up against and the relief felt when the cleanup was completed.



OUTREACH IN ACTION

The Outreach Ministry recently authorized \$500 for Earthquake Relief in Haiti (through the United Church of Christ), \$1,000 to the Windham No Freeze Hospitality Center and \$1,000 to the WAIM Fuel Fund. These outreach funds are possible because of your faithful giving through your pledges. If you would personally like to give additional funds to any of our mission outreach programs, you may do that by sending a check to the church with the name of the program you wish to support in the memo line on the check.

The **Food Pantry** is reaching out to the students and we are beginning to see many new guests, particularly international graduate students. We will soon be open more hours each week so a training session for new volunteers is being planned. If you would like to spend an hour or two a week in the pantry, please contact Jane Joesten to be added to our list. Two people will be scheduled together. You will have some fellowship time because you won't be busy continuously.

Jan Castle is picking up items from the warehouse almost every week. Since we have partnered with Foodshare, we obtain most all food at no cost. So if you would like to contribute to the needs of the food pantry, we are suggesting the following:

- Health and beauty supplies such as:
 - Deodorant
 - o Shampoo
 - o tooth brushes
 - o toothpaste
 - o toilet tissue
 - o paper towels
 - o napkins
- Coffee (instant & brew) and Tea
- Feminine products
- Pet food
- Cleaning supplies
- Dish and clothes detergents
- Condiments (Mayonnaise, mustard, ketchup, relish, oil)
- Juices
- Spices
- Eggs (can go right into the refrigerator)
- Butter (can be stored in the refrigerator or freezer)



SERVICE SEWING UPDATES

Thank you to everyone who contributed needed supplies for the School Kits! We are blessed to have such a generous congregation!

Recent natural disasters have highlighted the urgent and essential need.

Recent natural disasters have highlighted the urgent and essential need for Hygiene kits.

Supplies Needed:

- ✓ One hand towel measuring approximately 15" x 28" to 16" x 32" (no fingertip, bath, dish towel or micro-fiber)
- ✓ One washcloth
- ✓ One wide-tooth comb removed from the package
- ✓ One fingernail or toenail clipper, removed from the package
- ✓ One bath size bar of soap, in the original package
- ✓ One toothbrush, in the original package
- √ 10 standard size Band-aids

All items need to fit inside a one-gallon Ziploc type bag. Remove excess air from the bag and seal before boxing. Do not add any extra items or toothpaste. A tube of extended expiration date toothpaste will be added to each hygiene kit just prior to its journey.
